Councilmen of the city of Corning,  
Kansas:

Section 1. No person shall, in this city, ride or drive, or cause to be ridden or driven, any animal in any street, alley, highway or other public place, faster than a moderate gait, or shall ride or drive, or cause to be ridden or driven any such animal, or any vehicle thereto attached, in such a manner as to come in collision with, or strike any other object or person, or shall leave any such animal standing in any street, alley or other public place, without being fastened or guarded so as to prevent its running away, or shall turn any such animal loose in any street, alley or other public place.

Sec. 2. No person shall, in this city, wear under his clothes, or conceal about his person, any pistol or revolver, except by special permission by the Mayor, which permission may be revoked at any time, nor shall any person wear under his clothes or concealed about his person, any shotgun, cross knuckles, knuckles of lead, brass or other metal, or any bowie knife, razor, billie, dirk knife or dagger, or any knife resembling a bowie knife or any other deadly or dangerous weapon. Any person violating, neglecting or failing to comply with any provision or requirement of this section shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and, upon conviction thereof before the Police Judge, shall be fined not less than five dollars and not more than one hundred dollars. Provided, however, that this section shall not be so construed as to prevent any United States, state, county or city officer, or any member of the city government from carrying such weapons as may be necessary in the proper discharge of his duties.

Sec. 3. Any person while exercising the right of carrying arms, and any other person, who shall wrongfully draw or threaten to use any arms or do any other act calculated to cause apprehension or alarm among the citizens of said city, shall, upon conviction thereof before the Police Judge, be fined in any sum not less than one dollar nor more than one hundred dollars.

Sec. 4. No person shall, in or upon any street, alley, sidewalk or other public place, fly a kite, or engage in any sport or exercise likely to scare horses or embarrass, obstruct or interfere with the passage of vehicles or pedestrians.

Sec. 5. No person or persons shall play, throw, pitch, catch, knock or bat ball, in or upon Main street within the city of Corning, or play at or practice any other game or amusement likely to cause damage to person or property at any place within the said city.

Sec. 6. No person shall discharge any gun, pistol or other fire arm, except upon his own premises, and there only in proper and necessary cases. Provided, that this section shall not be so construed as to prevent any United States, State, county or city officer from discharging any firearm in the execution of his official duties.

Sec. 7. No person shall fire or set off any squibs, crackers, gunpowder or fireworks in any street, alley or other public place, or in any yard, public or private, within the limits of the city, unless by a written permit from the Mayor, which permit shall specify the object, prescribe the location, and limit the time of such firing. Provided, that this shall not be extended to the prohibition of the usual demonstrations on the first of January, the twenty second of February, the fourth of July and the twenty-fifth of December.

upon conviction thereof before the Police Judge, shall, where no other penalty is provided, be fined not less than one dollar and not more than one hundred dollars, or be punished by imprisonment not exceeding three months, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Sec. 14. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the Corning Independent.
