**Europe to California for \$300.**  
We are assured by the energetic managers of the Southern Pacific Railroad that, within two years, that road will have its own through, independent line completed from San Francisco to Galveston, a distance of 2140 miles. The Southern Pacific will form a junction, in about two months, with the Atchafalaya, Topoka and Santa Fe line at El Paso, the latter town being 800 miles distant from Galveston, and 1200 miles from this city; but El Paso will only be a temporary junction; the Southern Pacific will push on Eastward, as we have said, until it reaches Galveston. A line of heavy freight and immigrant steamers will run from Galveston to Liverpool, Bremen and Hamburg. Immigrants will be brought from those ports to California for \$300, and perhaps less. The comparatively empty valleys and unsettled grape-growing hill-sides of the State, will be rapidly filled up with an industrious and desirable population. **Rich Mine.**  
Two thousand pounds of rock recently taken from the Ford, McDonald & Mullen mine at Grass Valley, at a depth of 110 feet, is estimated to be worth from \$25,000 to \$30,000. Some pieces of a few pounds weight are the value of \$30 and \$50. The *Union* says that more of the like character will be taken out at the next stripping of the ledge. It is intended to put the rock through the batteries in a short time, but there are several hundred pounds of it which is more valuable to sell for jewelry than to reduce for bullion. There has been sufficient development in the claim to prove that it is the richest spot of ground in California, as no piece of quartz ground has ever yielded as much gold from the same space and there are no indications that the bonanza is near exhausted. On the contrary, the latest developments are the richest that have been made.

**Concealed Weapons.**

The Board of Trustees of Napa, at  
their last meeting, passed an ordi-  
nance against carrying concealed  
weapons. It is as follows:

SECTION 1. Every person not being a  
peace officer, who shall within the corpo-  
rate limits of the City of Napa, carry or  
wear any dirk, pistol, sword-in-cane,  
slingshot, or other dangerous or deadly  
weapon concealed, except by special per-  
mission in writing from the President of  
the Board of Trustees of said city, shall  
upon conviction thereof before any Court  
of competent jurisdiction, be deemed  
guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be  
fined in any sum not less than Ten nor  
more than One Hundred Dollars, and be  
imprisoned until such fine be paid, not  
exceeding one day for each dollar of such  
fine.
