PRESIDENT REDUCES THE FOREST RESERVE OF IDAHO TO A CONSERVATION RESERVE.

President Reduces the Forest Reserve of Idaho to a Conservation Reserve. The president has signed proclamation reducing four of the national forests in Idaho by a total of 113,252 acres. The largest reduction is in the Malheur forest, which loses 71,152 acres. The other three are the Snake River, the Clear Fork Snake, and the Pend Oreille. The president has also signed proclamation eliminating from other Idaho forests what he made them.

ORDINANCE No. 160.

AN ORDINANCE

DEFINING OFFENSES AGAINST THE
PEACE AND GOOD ORDER OF THE
CITY OF CALDWELL, AND PROVID-
ING PUNISHMENT THEREFORE.
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND
COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CALD-
WELL.

Section 1. Any person discharging an air
gun, sparrow gun, flipper or other simi-
lar contrivance within the limits of the City of Cald-
well, shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined in
any sum not to exceed one hundred dollars.

Section 2. Any person who shall commit an
offense as defined by

sons assemble together for the purpose of dancing, shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined in any sum not exceeding one hundred dollars.

Section 10. Any person excepting peace officers who shall carry any sling shot, or any concealed deadly weapon without the permission of the mayor first had and obtained within the City of Caldwell, shall upon conviction thereof, be liable to a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars.

Section 11. Any person who shall wilfully disturb or disquiet any assemblage of persons met for religious yorship or other lawful pur-

be fined in any sum not exceeding one hundred dollars.

Section 19. Any person not an officer discharging any firearms within the limits of the City of Caldwell, without a sufficient breastworks or battery for the protection of the citizens, shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined in any sum not exceeding one hundred dollars.

Section 20. Every person who deals, plays,
